The doors of J-D Lanes opened in the fall of 1973 by Jim and Doris Cochran. The name coming from Jim and Doris. They operated the lanes for several years, even though Jim had to quit bowling after a year due to his knee's swelling and the pain becoming too much to bare.

Doris bowled until about 5 years ago, when she had to quit because of a heel spur, making it too painful to bowl. She has bowled in a lot of tournaments and went on some of our bowling bus trips.

Over the years, all the Cochran family members bowled. Their son, Jerry, and his four sisters, Sandy Warrington, Jamie Baker, Pam Rusen, and Brenda Carter. Jerry's wife, Leslie, is also a bowler. All of Jerry and Leslie's children bowl, Nickie Hudson, Adrean Thompson and Josh Cochran. They started to bowl in the

Junior program and have moved onto adult leagues.

The Junior League started at J-D Lanes in 1973 and is still bowling.

The first man to roll a 300 game at the lanes was Tom Stanwick about 1978. Ellen Orr was the first woman to roll a 300 game in 1983.

The oldest bowlers at J-D Lanes are Delores Spragg, 77 years young and Robert Adam, 82 years young. Hope to see you bowling a lot more years.

J-D has four women in the McCook Hall of Fame. They are Norma Prather, 1990 General Welfare, Eleanor Santille, 2003 General Welfare, Penny Gilbert, 2006 Bowling Ability, and Pennie Eberhart, 2009 Bowling Ability.

Charlie Busby went into the men's Hall of Fame in 2004.

Since Jerry and Leslie bought the center, they have hosted many tournaments for the men, women and the youth. March 13 and 14, 2010 they



are hosting the Adult - Youth Tournament sponsored by the McCook WBA. Also on May 2nd they will host the McCook Senior Tournament.

They have open bowling on Tuesday evenings, Thursday evening, Friday evenings, Saturday afternoons and evenings and Sunday evenings.

More History From Jerry Cochran

J-D Lanes was built in 1973. The Dunbar School House, which is the red-brick building at the entrance of J-D Lanes, was constructed in 1903. During segregation, the black children attended the Dunbar School and the white children attended the current Harrison Central High School building located on East Market Street in Cadiz. The Dunbar building functioned as a school until the early 1950's. After the abandoning of the Dunbar School building, a man from the Cleveland area bought the property with the help of the community. He started a company named U.S. Power Plants Incorporated. This company was funded by the sale of stock and investments from the wealthy families of the community. U.S. Power Plants Inc. started manufacturing AC and DC generators. The U.S. Power Plants Inc. employed about 70 people until it filed bankruptcy.

After the bankruptcy of the U. S. Power Plants Inc., another company was formed by the same Cleveland man. This company was named The Cadiz Manufacturing Company. This company built DC magnet charging generators that attached onto the cranes in the steel mills and metal scrap yards and lift the scrap metal to unload it. The Cadiz Manufacturing Company was in business from 1950 - 1980. The death of the Cleveland entrepreneur gave Harry (Jim) Cochran a chance to buy the business in 1972. Jim Cochran and the Cadiz Manufacturing survived through the 1970-1980's until Reaganomics hit the economy, steel mills slowed and the need for the magnet generators ceased. This company went from feast

to famine almost overnight. The Cadiz Manufacturing Company went from not being able to fulfill all the orders to sales plummeting to

nothing. The last year of the Cadiz Manufacturing Company only two people were employed, Jim and Jerry Cochran. Prior to the decline of the business, Jim decided to immediately start planning the renovation of the building. Jim decided to build a bowling alley by using some of the space from The Cadiz Manufacturing Company. All the machinery was moved to one side of the building and a wall was erected down the middle to form the present J-D Lanes. J-D Lanes opened in the fall of 1973 and had 15 leagues. From 1973 until 1976, Jerry Cochran managed both businesses and became the Vice-President of the Cadiz Manufacturing Company. Rick Rusen also helped manage the bowling alley through the 1970's to the late 1980's.

The struggling Cadiz Manufacturing Company was sold to Economy Electric Company in Youngstown, Ohio in 1982. Jim's son Jerry went to work for Economy Electric Company for one year and then left to become a car salesman. Jerry and Leslie Cochran then decided to buy the building from Jerry's parents, Jim and Doris Cochran in 1988. Since the purchase of the lanes, Jerry and Leslie have made physical improvements and updates, including an expanded game room and kitchen, bowling madness and Monte Carlo, auto scoring, a pro shop, and facilities for banquets and birthday parties. The family business continues to grow in today's uncertain economy with the help of Jerry and Leslie's children and grandchildren and our dedicated bowlers and patrons. The business will remain in the family as it has since 1972 and will serve the needs of the community and remain an enjoyable place for friends and families to come together and spend time with one another.
